

Premier Sport Psychology offers mentorship for the CMPC certification by our providers who are AASP-Approved mentors. The purpose of this working relationship is to enhance the professional education and development of the mentee in the discipline of applied sport psychology. This is an educational, collegial relationship, not a supervisory relationship. The mentee will practice only within the scope of their education, training, experience, licensure, and the ethical standards of their profession, and laws of their state or country. The mentee will work only with those clients and employ only those techniques that they would be qualified to work with even if they had not obtained this mentorship. Therefore, the mentor shall have no direct or indirect responsibility for the services performed, for the procedures and techniques employed by the mentee, and for the effects on clients.

The educational content of the mentorship shall include such topics as psychological research and theory related to applied sport psychology, assessment methods, intervention techniques, planning, executing, and evaluating interventions, development and marketing of a practice, the business of sport psychology, ethical issues, case reviews, and other relevant topics agreed upon by both parties.

The cost of CMPC mentorship through Premier Sport Psychology is \$175/hour.

Premier Sport Psychology is willing to work with mentees who meet the following criteria:

- 1. Provide their own clientele to be discussed during the mentorship sessions. Premier Sport Psychology will not provide clients for mentees.
- 2. Read, understand, and abide by the AASP Ethical Principles and Standards.
- 3. Hold and maintain appropriate and sufficient malpractice insurance.
- 4. Provide the mentor with copies of current license, malpractice face sheet, and current curriculum vitae.
- 5. No history of substantiated malpractice or board complaints.
